The Northeast Texas Community College prepares this report on an annual basis to comply with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Act. This report is prepared with the cooperation of the local police departments; Office of Student Life; Office of Residence Life; Office of Admissions; and Human Resources Office.

Campus crime arrest and referral statistics include those reported to: local police where crimes occur on the street in front of our campus; designated campus officials and campus security authorities. This would include Deans, Director of Student Housing; Resident Advisors; Faculty advisors to student groups, coaches; Human Resource Officers and Office of Student Life staff. Each year, an e-mail notification is made to all enrolled students that provides the web site to access this report. Faculty and staff also receive an e-mail notification. The Admissions Office home page on the NTCC web site gives the web site address for this report. Copies of this report can be obtained at the Office of Administrative Services.

Northeast Texas Community College is committed to putting the health and safety of our students, employees and visitors above all other priorities. There is nothing more important than a human life. This report is designed to inform students and employees of various policies, procedures and prevention methods employed by NTCC. This report also informs students and staff of the type and amount of crime that has occurred on the campus over the past three years.

Incident Reporting and Response

Regular Reporting Procedures

Any on-campus emergency, criminal offense or suspected criminal activity should be reported immediately. Students are encouraged to report this information to either NTCC Security (call **8127** from any campus phone or **903-563-1417** from your cell phone) or by using the RED emergency phones mounted on Administration, Business Technology, Math/Science, Resident Hall East and FIT buildings. You can also call the Titus County Police Department by dialing 911. In addition, you can report a crime to the following areas:

If a crime is not reported promptly, evidence may be destroyed, leads could be missed and the potential to apprehend a suspect could be lost. Only by knowing what's really happening in the campus community can steps be taken to help solve, reduce or prevent crimes from happening in the first place. Crimes that aren't reported to authorities could give the campus community a false sense of safety so we encourage you to report any and all violations.

If you are a victim of a crime and do not want to pursue action within the Campus System or the Criminal Justice System, you may still file a confidential report. You can contact any of the Campus Security Authorities and report a crime without revealing your identity. NTCC can then keep an accurate record of the number of crimes, reveal crime patterns and be able to alert the campus community to potential

dangers. Felony Crimes on campus can also be reported anonymously by calling the local Crime stoppers number – 903-575-2141.

Reporting Criminal Offenses to Campus Security Authorities

NTCC encourages anyone who is a victim or witness/bystander to any crime to promptly report the incident to the police. As an option, criminal offenses may also be reported to designated campus security authorities (CSA) (including, but not limited to) Director of Student Life; Deans; Human Resource Officers; Director of Residence Life; Coordinator of Student Activities; Director of Recreation and Wellness; Resident Advisors and Advisors to student organizations. If a crime is reported to a CSA, they must in turn notify NTCC Security with this information. Even if the reporting person does not want a police investigation, the CSA must still report the information to NTCC Security and that crime will be reported in the annual crime statistics report.

NTCC Security, Student Services Offices and other campus security authorities will accept confidential and anonymous reports of crime for inclusion in the annual statistical report.

Who is a Campus Security Authority?

In addition to the members of the NTCC Security Department, the following are considered to be Campus Security Authorities, hereafter referred to as CSAs.

- *Any individual or organization specified in an institution's statement of campus security policy as an individual or organization to which students and employees should report criminal offenses.*
- *Any official with significant responsibility for student and campus activities, including, but not limited to, officials who manage or otherwise oversee student and campus activities. For example, staff responsible for campus student housing, a student center, or student extra-curricular activities; a director of athletics or a team coach; faculty advisors to student groups; staff responsible for student discipline, and campus judicial staff. An **official** is defined as *any person who has the authority and the duty to take action or respond to particular issues on behalf of the institution.**

What are Campus Security Authorities required to do?

CSAs are responsible for reporting all those allegations of crimes specified in the Clery Act that are reported to them, and that they conclude were made in good faith, to the NTCC Security Department. The crimes specified in the Clery Act are: murder/non-negligent manslaughter; negligent manslaughter; forcible and non-forcible sex offenses; robbery; aggravated assault; burglary; motor vehicle theft; domestic violence; dating violence; stalking and arson. If there is evidence that the perpetrator was motivated by bias, then simple assault, larceny (theft), intimidation, and vandalism must be reported as well (please see the definitions provided below). Timely submission of reports by CSAs is very important. If a crime is reported to a CSA, but goes no farther than that, NTCC will be unable to fully meet its obligations under the law. Moreover, the campus community may lack information that could help them to stay safe.

What Should a Campus Security Authority Avoid Doing?

CSAs are not responsible for determining whether a crime took place. CSAs are also not responsible for attempting to apprehend an alleged perpetrator of a crime. These are matters best left to law enforcement personnel. CSAs should refrain from attempting to convince a victim to contact law enforcement if the victim chooses not to do so. However, they may note that crimes can be reported to the police anonymously.

How do Campus Security Authorities Fulfill Their Responsibilities?

When a crime is reported to a CSA, they should first ask the reporting party if they would like to report the crime to the police. If they would, they should contact the NTCC Security Department at (903) 434-1417 or Titus County Sheriff's Department at (903) 572-6641. In the event that an in-progress emergency is being reported, the reporting party should be advised to call 911 immediately. If they are unable to, the CSA may do so on their behalf.

If the reporting party does not want to contact the police about the crime, the CSA should complete a Campus Security Authority Crime Report Form. Even if the reporting party does wish to contact the police about the crime, the CSA may complete the form for their records (check the appropriate box for the law enforcement agency the crime was/will be reported to). The procedure for completing the form is as follows:

- Have the reporting party read the top (boxed) portion of the form.
- Ask if they have reported, or are going to report, the crime to the police. Advise them that reporting a crime to the police does not commit them to filing charges. Crimes may be reported anonymously if the victim/reporting party so desires.
- Personal identifying information for the reporting party should be included if available. This will help to avoid double counting crimes. No such personal identifying information will be included in the Clery statistical disclosures.
- If a victim does not want the report to go any further than the CSA, they should be advised that the CSA is required to submit the report for statistical purposes. However, the report can be submitted without identifying the victim.
- It is very important that the location of the crime is reported as precisely as possible. A building name, parking lot number, close address, or cross street should be provided.
- A description of the crime should be given, including as much detail as possible. This is to aid in the determination of exactly what crime occurred. It is important to note any injuries sustained or weapons used. The reporting party should indicate if they feel that the perpetrator committed the crime because of bias; and, if so, what lead them to believe that to be the case.
- .
- Liquor, drug, and weapon offenses are reported when an arrest (including a citation) is involved or a referral for campus disciplinary action is made. Note the number of people arrested or referred.
- If possible, determine what Clery Act geographical location the crime occurred in. Consult the location definitions provided below as needed. If in doubt contact NTCC Security at (903)563- 1417.

When the form is completed, please forward it as soon as possible rtaylor@ntcc.edu. The form may also be submitted by Fax to 1-866-740-3587 or 903-434-4407. Some departments may wish to retain a copy for their files. If so, the forms should be retained for at least three years.

Campus Security Authority Training

The Director of Student Housing trains RA's to the dormitories at the beginning of every semester.

Crime Definitions

Murder and Non-negligent Manslaughter – The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

Negligent Manslaughter – The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Sex Offense Forcible (F) – Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving *consent: forcible rape; forcible sodomy; sexual assault with an object; and forcible fondling.

Sex Offense Non Forcible (N) – Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse: incest; statutory rape.

Robbery - The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault – An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. It is not necessary for an injury to result when a gun, knife or other weapon is used in the commission of the crime.

Simple Assault – Assaults and attempted assaults where no weapon was used and which did not result in a serious or aggravated injury to the victim. (Currently, this crime category only applies to hate crimes.)

Burglary – The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Motor Vehicle Theft – The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned-including joyriding.)

Arson – Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Liquor Law Violation – The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still, furnishing liquor to a minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; or any attempts to commit any of the foregoing violations. Note: this list does not include public drunkenness and driving under the influence.

Drug Law Violation – Violations of State and local laws related to the possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of illicit drugs.

Weapon Law Violation – The violation of laws or ordinances regulating weapons.

Domestic Violence – means a felony or misdemeanor crime of violence committed by:

- a current or former spouse or intimate partner of the victim,
- a person with whom the victim shares a child in common,
- a person who is cohabitating with or has cohabitated with the victim as a spouse or intimate partner
- any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction.

Dating Violence – means violence committed by a person”

- who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim; and where the existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on a consideration of the following factors:
 1. the length of the relationship;
 2. the type of relationship;
 3. the frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship.

Stalking means - engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to:

- fear for his or her safety or the safety of others; or
- suffer substantial emotional distress.

Hate Crimes – Any crime that manifests evidence that the victim was intentionally selected because of the victim's actual or perceived race; religion; gender; sexual orientation; ethnicity or physical/mental disabilities.

Forcible Fondling- The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, forcibly and/or against that person's will. It may also happen without force or against that person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.

Disciplinary Referrals – incidents in which a student was not arrested but was referred for campus disciplinary action for liquor law violations, drug law violations, and illegal weapons possession.

*consent PC 1.07-means assent in fact, whether express or apparent.

Location Definitions

Campus – (i) any building or property owned or controlled by an institution within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area and used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to, the institution's educational purposes, including residence halls; and

(ii) any building or property that is within or reasonably contiguous to the area identified in paragraph (i) of this definition, that is owned by the institution but controlled by another person, is frequently used by students and supports institutional purposes (such as a food or other retail vendor).

Non-Campus – (i) Any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization that is officially recognized by the institution; or (ii) any building or property owned or controlled by an institution that is used in direct support of, or in relation to the institution's educational purposes, is frequently used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution.

Housing – Residence Halls or other college-owned residences.

Public Property—"public property" is defined by the Clery Act regulations as all public property including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities that are within the campus, or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus. This includes the sidewalk across the street from our campus, but does not include public property beyond the sidewalk.

Clery Act Timely Warning Policy

In the event that a Clery reportable crime happens on the NTCC campus that the Vice President of Advancement (or his designee) judges to be an ongoing or continuing threat to the campus community, a campus-wide "timely warning" will be issued. The warning will be issued through the campus School Messenger System which will send emergency phone messages and e-mails to all students and employees. This same message will be displayed on our web page, our Facebook page, and all electronic signage throughout the Campus. The "Timely Warning" message that goes out will be the product of discussions of the Campus President and the Emergency Management Team. The Communications Manager will send out Timely Warnings.

Anyone having knowledge of an ongoing or continuing threat to the campus community that may warrant a timely warning to be issued should immediately report this information to the NTCC Security and/or the Titus County Sherriff department. The safety and security of the campus community is of the utmost importance.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

NTCC has taken an ongoing approach to update our Emergency Management Plan since the spring of 2013. NTCC is continuing to update our approach to emergency management with consideration of all hazards. NTCC will conduct some type of exercise bi-annually to test the effectiveness of the plan. This may consist of a table-top exercise or an actual drill that would test some aspect of the plan. Fire and evacuation drills in our dormitories will be held each semester. In addition to tests the online security page has been updated to include most emergency resources and instructions sent out at the beginning of Spring, Fall, and Summer semesters.

In the event of an actual emergency on campus, NTCC has several systems in place for communicating information quickly to the campus community. NTCC uses the Regroup Emergency Notification System. This is an emergency notification system that gives NTCC the ability to communicate health and safety emergency information quickly via phone, e-mail, text messages and web pages throughout the Campus. Each building is also equipped with a PA system that will be utilized during emergencies.

NTCC will, without delay, notify the campus community of any immediate threat to the health and/or safety of students or employees occurring on campus. The College President or designee and available cabinet members; the Director of Communications Manager; and the Physical Plant Director will meet in person if possible, or by phone and determine the threat to the Campus and surrounding community. This group will determine the threat with the facts at hand and decide if a message is to be sent and if so, who to send it to, and the content of the message. The Director of Communications (with the Director of IT as backup) will then activate the emergency notification system, unless the notification shall in some way compromise the efforts to assist victims or contain, respond to or mitigate the emergency. If the group determines the surrounding community should also be notified, the Director of Communications shall contact local radio, television and news services.

Campus Access and Security

NTCC is a public and open campus. For that reason, no effort is made to restrict the general public from entering the campus. However, the NTCC Security reserves the right to ban individuals from the campus if they are considered a threat to the well-being of the campus community.

Resident Hall East and West at NTCC dormitory is locked 24 hours a day and entry can only be gained by residents with a key card. Security cameras are located throughout the dormitory and its parking lot and as well as all other buildings and parking lots throughout the campus. The dormitory is controlled locked during normal semesters and students can only gain entry by using their issued swipe cards or FOBS.

The campus is routinely inspected for environmental safety hazards such as insufficient lighting; overgrown shrubbery; cracked sidewalks or parking lots and anything that could pose a hazard to members of the campus community.



Safety Check Points

- ✓ Walk with friends in lighted areas.
- ✓ Always lock your car.
- ✓ Park in well-lighted areas.
- ✓ Before entering your vehicle, have your keys out and check the interior of the vehicle.
- ✓ Never leave personal property unattended.
- ✓ Carry personal items in a backpack or similar device to keep your hands free at all times.
- ✓ Report any suspicious activity or person to NTCC Security – Dial 8127 from any phone on NTCC campus or 903-563-1417 from your cell phone.
- ✓ Alter your route of travel between home and campus. Whether walking, jogging, biking, etc., vary your routine and walk with a partner

Providing a secure campus is of the utmost importance to NTCC. NTCC, through a continuous update of our crime prevention programs, is striving to provide a safe, secure environment for students and staff. Students and staff must also assist the campus, being responsible for their own safety and the safety of others.

NTCC campus has numerous security features. Most buildings at the NTCC campus are equipped with video cameras inside and outside the buildings. There are now five emergency phones. They are located on Math/Science, Administration, Business Technology, Resident Hall East, and Fitness Center. These phones are housed in a identifiable red box mounted on the exterior of the previous listed buildings. To use a the Red Emergency Phone simply open box and pick phone waiting until you are connected to a security officer on campus.

An Emergency Management Plan is in place to direct students and staff in exact procedures to follow in any given emergency. The plan was updated in the Spring of 2013 and put on flipcharts that can be found in all/most classrooms. It may also be viewed on NTCC web site

Some form of drill is conducted every semester for example we conducted a campus wide tornado drill fall of 2014, another tornado drill in spring of 2015 and a county wide active shooter drill in summer of 2015 and an equipment and walk through drill in Fall of 2015. Fire alarm drills are conducted at least once a semester at our dormitories. A security officer is on duty 24 hours a day and will assist any student or staff in getting to their vehicle safely. Security will also assist in opening locked car doors and providing jump-starts when needed.

Students are able to view online emergency numbers; hotlines; off campus counseling; safety shelters on the security link on our website. They also may receive information from our security department, office of Student Affairs, Office of Human Resources, Office of Administrative Affairs by contacting one of these offices.

Sexual Assault

Sexual Assault and Aggravated Sexual Assault are serious felony crimes. NTCC considers it essential to provide Sexual Assault Awareness Programs for students and employees, aimed at the prevention of such crimes. NTCC Security and the Office of Student and Outreach Services, offer brochures and other

Date Rape Prevention Checklist

- ✓ Set sexual limits. You don't "owe" anyone sex. Communicate those limits. People can't read your mind.
- ✓ Trust your feelings. If you feel pressured, you probably are.
- ✓ Pay attention to behavior that doesn't seem right. Power stares, someone who grabs or pushes, someone who doesn't listen or disregards what you're saying, someone who blocks your way, or someone sitting or standing uncomfortably close are all clues that you should stay alert.
- ✓ Be assertive. Get angry and act immediately with a negative response if things seem out of control. Stand up for yourself. It's ok to make a scene or be rude in public if someone is pressuring you which may help you to get away from that person.

literature aimed at promoting awareness of rape, date rape, and other sex offenses. Occasionally, speakers from various agencies are invited to the campus to present programs on sexual assault awareness and prevention. NTCC began providing this information at orientation of dormitory students making it a mandatory meeting during the 2014/2015 semesters and plan on expanding this program. NTCC has posters and brochures in key locations to provide awareness on these issues as well as to inform potential victims/victims avenues of help.

If a sex-related offense does occur on campus, the victim is encouraged to report the incident to the NTCC Security and/or the Titus County Sheriff Department. If a sexual assault is reported to any NTCC employee, that employee will assist the subject in notifying Campus Security at 903-563-1417 and/or the sheriff Department by calling 911. It is extremely important for the victim to receive immediate medical treatment, while preserving any physical evidence related to the crime. For this reason, the victim should not bathe, shower, douche, or change clothes prior to a medical exam. A representative from the Rape Crisis Center will be contacted to meet with the victim at the hospital. NTCC has a contract with a local Counseling firm to provide counseling to students at no cost. This counseling can be obtained by contacting the Human Resources Director at 903-434-8182.

Victims of sexual crimes must decide whether to call the police and press charges in these cases. Most rapists are repeat offenders and your report may prevent future acts from occurring. On-campus disciplinary action in cases of alleged sexual assault will be handled in accordance with the Policy on Sexual Harassment in the Campus Policy and Procedure Manual. Both the accuser and the accused have the same opportunity to have witnesses present during a campus disciplinary proceeding. Both the accuser and the accused shall be informed of the outcome of any campus disciplinary proceeding brought, alleging sexual assault. If the accused is a student at NTCC, the Vice President of Student and Outreach Services shall appoint a Hearing Committee who shall hear the facts of the case. If the Hearing Committee determines the student's behavior violates acceptable Campus conduct, the Vice President of Student and Outreach Services may suspend or expel the student from the Campus. Victims of sexual assault will be notified of various options for changing academic schedules and living situations upon their request.

Criminal Prosecution and Student Disciplinary Hearings

The victim of a sexual assault may choose for the investigation to be pursued through the criminal justice system, the campus disciplinary system or both. NTCC Security, with the victim's consent, will immediately notify Titus County sheriff Department and aid victim in any appropriate way and aid law enforcement also. All reports of crimes including sexual assault will be investigated by NTCC Security and the office of Student Services. The Campus will change a victim's academic and living situations after an alleged sex offense by making special accommodations such as distance learning options, if those changes are

requested by the victim and are reasonably available. Campus disciplinary action may be imposed on individual students, recognized student organizations and/or Campus faculty and staff found in violation of the Campus sexual misconduct policy. In addition to any criminal prosecution, students may be placed on probation, suspended or expelled, for committing violent or criminal acts on campus or at campus related events. Campus disciplinary proceedings are detailed in the NTCC Student Handbook. In accordance with the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure Article 57, victims may use a pseudonym to protect their identity. A pseudonym is a fictitious name or set of initials chosen by the victim to be used in all public files and records concerning the sexual assault.

What happens when Security is called?

Security will respond immediately and notify Titus County sheriff Department. An ambulance or other means of transportation will be provided by NTCC. A physical examination is necessary to take care of obvious and/or hidden physical injuries and will provide the opportunity for the victim to discuss with a physician potential pregnancy or communicable disease concerns. In addition, emergency room personnel will call the local rape crisis center so that a counselor can provide support and education.

To preserve evidence for an examination, a victim:

- Should not shower, bathe or douche;
- Should not comb hair or wash hands;
- Should try not to urinate;
- Should not smoke, eat, brush teeth, or rinse mouth if oral contact took place; and
- Should not change clothes. (A victim should carry a change of clothes in case the clothes they are wearing need to be kept for evidence. If clothes must be changed, a victim should place them in a paper bag because plastic may destroy evidence).

A criminal investigator will interview the victim. The victim has the option of requesting a concealed identity or pseudonym during the investigation. In **all** cases the victim will be treated with compassion, consideration, understanding and patience during the interview. The officer will make every attempt to maintain the confidentiality of the victim.

Rights of Both Parties

1. Both the accused and accuser are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during an institutional disciplinary proceeding, including the opportunity to be accompanied to any related meeting or proceeding by an advisor of their choice.
2. Both the accused and the accuser must be informed of the outcome of any institutional disciplinary proceeding that is brought alleging a sex offense. Compliance with this paragraph does not constitute a violation of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). For the purpose of this paragraph, the outcome of a disciplinary proceeding means only the institution's final determination with respect to the alleged sex offense and any sanction that is imposed against the accused.

Written Request

NTCC will disclose to the alleged victim of a crime of violence, or non-forcible sex offense, the results of any disciplinary hearing conducted by the university against the student who is the alleged perpetrator of the crime or offense. If the alleged victim is deceased as a result of the crime or

offense, the institution will provide the results of the disciplinary hearing to the victim's next of kin, if requested in writing.

Additional Law Enforcement Information

In Texas, sexual assault (rape) is an offense that ranges from a second degree felony to a first degree felony punishable by a sentence ranging from two to ninety-nine years in prison and a fine of up to \$10,000. The definition of sexual assault may be found in Texas Penal Code 22.011 and is also found on the security link on the NTCC website.

Title IX Reporting

Individuals may also report a sex offense to the campus Title IX coordinator. This individual is responsible for coordinating the Campus compliance with Title IX. The Title IX coordinator's office is located in the department of Human Resources which currently resides in the Administration building on NTCC's main campus and the phone number is (903)434-8121.

Sexual Harassment

Sexual harassment of students and employees at Northeast Texas Community College is unacceptable and will not be tolerated. Any member of the Campus community violating this policy will be subject to disciplinary actions.

Sex Offender Registration Information

The Federal Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act requires institutions of higher education to advise the campus community where law enforcement agency information, provided by a State concerning registered sex offenders, may be obtained.

In the State of Texas, the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is the statewide source of information on sex offenders required by law to register. The DPS Sex Offender Registration open record information may be obtained at the internet location: <https://records.txdps.state.tx.us/DpsWebsite/index.aspx>

In addition, the Texas DPS is required to notify NTCC if a registered sex offender is either enrolled, employed or carrying on some type vocation at NTCC.

In the event that a registered offender(s) is working or enrolled in classes at NTCC, a list of that person(s) name may be obtained at the Plant Services office in the Central Plant building or at the Office of the Vice-President of Student and Outreach Services in the Administration building.

In compliance with the Federal Student Right to Know Act and the Clery Act, information regarding graduation rates can be obtained from the Admission's Office by calling (903) 434-8205.

Drugs and Alcohol

All members of the campus community are expected to abide by state and federal laws regarding controlled substances, illegal drugs, and alcoholic beverages. The possession, use, or sale of illegal drugs (as defined by the Texas Penal Code) on campus is a violation of state law. Violations can result in both campus disciplinary action and criminal prosecution.

The possession, sale, consumption, manufacture, or furnishing of alcoholic beverages by students on NTCC property is strictly prohibited. Alcohol violations can also result in campus disciplinary action and criminal prosecution. If you or anyone you know feels as if they may have a problem with drug or alcohol dependency NTCC has established an DAP program which not only outlines policy but also provides avenues in which one may obtain help.

Health Risks of Alcohol

Health hazards associated with excessive use of alcohol or alcohol dependency include dramatic behavioral changes, retardation of motor skills, and impairment of reasoning and rational thinking. These factors result in a higher incidence of accidents and accidental death for such persons than for nonusers of alcohol.

Nutrition also suffers and vitamins and mineral deficiencies are frequent. Prolonged alcohol abuse causes bleeding from the intestinal tract, damage to nerves and the brain, liver damage, psychotic behavior and loss of memory and coordination. Other risks include impotence, inflammation of the pancreas, and damage to bone marrow, the heart, testes, ovaries and muscles. Damage to nerves and organs can be irreversible.

Health Risks of Other Drugs

Use of illicit drugs may lead to physiological and mental changes similar to those caused by alcohol, although changes are usually more severe and more sudden. Death or coma resulting from overdose of drugs is also more frequent. Illicit drugs are commonly classified in seven categories: Cocaine; Amphetamines; heroin and other opiates; hallucinogens; solvent inhalants, steroids and marijuana.

In addition to adverse effects associated with use of a particular drug, intravenous-drug users who use unsterilized needles or who share needles with other users can develop AIDS, hepatitis, tetanus and infections of the heart. Brain damage is also a real possibility.

High Risk Alcohol Intake

People who consume large amounts of alcohol over a short period of time can reach very high blood alcohol levels before they pass out. This can lead to decreased breathing and death. Vomiting associated with high levels of alcohol may also cause choking and death.

How to Help an Intoxicated Friend.

Do:

- Keep calm and get lots of help. Individuals with high alcohol-blood levels can be unpredictable and violent.
- Speak in a firm, clear, reassuring manner.
- Stay with a person who is vomiting. If the victim is lying down, turn them on their side, keep the tongue from falling back into the throat and protect them from choking.
- Monitor the person. If they become unconscious or appear to have problems breathing, seek medical help immediately by calling 911.

Don't:

- Don't try to walk, run or exercise the person and don't try to keep them awake.
- Don't force anything orally – food, liquids or drugs- in an attempt to sober them up.
- Don't try and give them a cold shower-this can be very dangerous.
- Don't try to restrain them without a lot of sober assistance.

Missing Student Notification

If a member of the NTCC campus community has reason to believe that a student who resides on-campus is missing, he or she should notify the campus Security Department at 903-563-1417 and the Director of Student Housing at 903-434-8168 so they can investigate whether the student is actually missing.

If the Director of Student Housing determines that the student is missing and has been for more than 24 hours, the Director of Student Housing will notify the student's emergency contact no later than 24 hours after the student is determined to be missing. If the missing student is under the age of 18 and is not an emancipated (legal independent status) individual, the Director of Student Housing will notify the student's parent or legal guardian and NTCC Security immediately after the student has been determined to be missing for more than 24 hours. NTCC security will notify Titus County Sheriff's Department no later than 24 hours.

In addition to registering an emergency contact, students residing on-campus have the option to identify confidentially an individual to be contacted in the event the student is determined to be missing for more than 24 hours. If a student has identified such an individual, NTCC will notify that individual no later than 24 hours after the student is determined to be missing. Students who wish to identify a confidential contact can do so through the Director of Student Housing.
