Filming the Un-Filmed Legends of Texas



Over five million have reportedly viewed dramatizations of the forced marches that took the Cherokee, Choctaw, and other native peoples out of the Southeast after 1830. And yet the "Texas Trail of Blood," which unlike the "Trail of Tears" involved a pitched battle in NE Texas, has until now evaded theatrical treatment.

On 17 February at 7 PM at the Whatley Center of NTCC, the scholars of Honors Northeast (above in Nacogdoches) will feature their dramatization of this formative event. Our scholars researched, wrote, choreographed, filmed, directed, and produced the show, and will appear in a panel afterward to discuss its significance.

We thank Jerald and Mary Lou Mowery of Scroggins, who have inspirited our 5 feature-length films. Thanks to them and others, our Ferguson film became the point of departure for a National Public Radio commentary, 27 September. This year we would like to give special thanks as well to Glenda Brogoitti, Mark Lesher Esq., and Hudson Old of the *East Texas Journal*--who taught us the value of this story. Administrators at NTCC, and Drs. Clay and Hearron facilitated research in Austin last May, and the filming in Nacogdoches last August. Would Honors be Elitist?

2017 is our Tenth-Year Honors Anniversary here!

This takes us back to 2006 when we first considered honors. Would we have an elitist program? In the spring of 2007, our French foreign-exchange student, Thibaut Guidet, wearing a black suit and gold tie, and Jilian Parton, daughter of a Winnsboro pharmacist, in a fashionable black suit of her own, offsetting her vermillion hair, strode down the aisle to accept 2 Boe awards for scholarship from the Great Plains Honors Council. Later in a day that was streaming with sunshine, our students posed by the stone- hedge-styled rocks outside the chapel of Abilene Christian University, looking very upper class.

It was beautiful. It was misleading. Of the 17 who would go on to win 29 national awards, eleven, two-thirds have been from poorer or lower-middle-class families. Our 36 most recognized scholarly citations since 2008 have gone 21 times to students who have qualified by various measures for special aid. Our 1-a-year "Jack Kent Cookes" are low-income awards.
