Stephani Calderon, with Vice President for Instruction, Dr. Ron Clinton, above, became the 2nd student in the history of NTCC to receive one of the most prestigious scholarships in the Western Hemisphere, the Jack Kent Cooke (JKC). This award allows Calderon to spend up to \$30,000 a year for up to

three years at the university of her choice.

Cooke was a Canadian-born mediaand-sports entrepreneur who left 800 million dollars to his foundation in 2000. Calderon was a most memorable Presidential Scholar (PS). winsome leader, she effected superlative group attainments on the Honors Counsel, Enactus, Phi Theta Kappa and Student Government. She also was a McGraw Hill poster winner scholarship. Her work on "Sovereign Default" won not only rave reviews in Boston at the National Collegiate Honors Council, but First Place in the 2013 Contest (p. 3). Her refulgent, good-natured zeal inspired patrons, students. professors, and administrators.




