Imagine a leader who owns 38 percent of the stock of the largest chicken company in the world in 2007, and yet he is also functioning as an evangelist. He was a leading patron of the Republican party yet he also fought a long-running feud with our area's most powerful Republican leader. He once described himself as a "Moses" who was elated to be leading thousands of people from Mexico to a promised land of greater abundance and spirituality. He talked about fulfilling environmental concerns but actually believed that it was better to be a "fisher of men" than to clean the fishbowl. Our film en-


