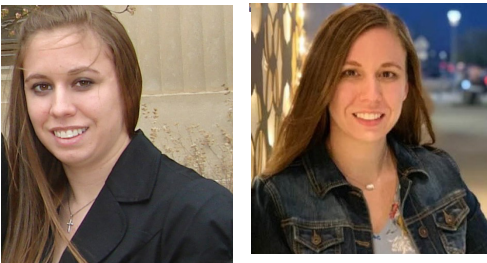

## Honors Northeast Scholars Attain Intervarsity Triumphs

Unlike our fine NTCC sports teams, honors has the chance to compete directly with universities. And this competition is significant. Community colleges lie at the intersection of America’s democratic culture, and its ever more rigid class structure. Are our colleges merely extensions of local school systems, or do they provide viable ways for small-town or lower-class students to advance? We have some advantages. Concerted mentoring. Caring donors. Administrative priorities. In the fall of 2022 these advantages made a difference. The most notable case in point, above, came in the form of the college’s first \$100 Portia Gordon Awards from the East Texas Historical Association. The ETHA awards were granted in 2019 to a student panel from A&M College Station, but this year, our Evan Sears, Jordan Chapin, and Skylar Fondren above, were the winners. Another remarkable outcome came in November with the results of the election of the Great Plains Honors Council. Our Honors Student

Council president, Skylar Fondren, became the seventh NTCC scholar since 2013 to represent the students of this association! The GPHC is comprised of 80 honors colleges and programs from Nebraska to Texas. Once again, not only did our student defeat a university student for the top spot, but it has become evident that NTCC is dominating the student elections of its regional council. How? The short answer is that university honors programs which should be tracking and mentoring their best performers to leverage their accomplishments--aren’t. University professors fundamentally are so fixated by their own research, that student success is distinctly peripheral.

Finally there are publications in journals, adjudicated by professors. *Touchstone*, published by the Texas State Historical Association, is the longest-term, most prestigious collegiate journal in the state. In the most recent issue, now on our honors landing page, our students have out-published those of any university.

Our Film on the Texas Suffragette, Minnie Fisher Cunningham



Our eleventh film premiere, on 24 March at 7 p.m. in the Whatley Center for the Performing Arts, will be the first effort to create a feature-length cinematic production around the story of the Texas Suffragettes. It is a story that deserves legendary acclaim. Texas broke away from the Solid South, opposed to suffrage, and became the tenth state to ratify the Nineteenth Amendment in 1919. A unique strategy of deference, what our film scholar, Michelle Calderon calls a “periphrastic strategy” led to the surprise upset. Skylar Fondren, our Texas Heritage Scholar (p.1) attained more control over the script, the story, and the filming than any student in our history. Sam Pollan is the producer. Wesson Scholar, Monse Rivero worked closely with Fondren. We are indebted to Kenny and Ann Goodson, and Dr. Maryna Otero for their special help. Skylar Hodson stars as the lead Texas suffragette, Minnie Fisher Cunningham.



The film is our first to create a simulacrum of the past in Fredericksburg, and the first trip to be financed entirely by our donors. We thank Jerald and Mary Lou Mowery especially for their long-term support.
