Course Syllabus: Fall II 2020

Course Description: 3 credit hours. A survey of the social, political, economical, cultural, religious and intellectual history of the world from the 15th century to the present. The course examines major cultural regions of the world in Africa, the Americas, Asia, Europe, and Oceania and their global interactions over time. Themes include maritime exploration and transoceanic empires, nation/state formation and industrialization, imperialism, global conflicts and resolutions, and global economic integration. The course emphasizes the development, interaction and impact of global exchange.

Prerequisite(s): None.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- Create an argument through the use of historical evidence.
- Analyze and interpret primary and secondary sources
- Analyze the effects of historical, social, political, economic, cultural, and global forces on this period of world history

Course Structure and Overview: Grades will be determined through a combination of assignments which will include Primary Source Analysis Assignments, Discussion Board postings, LearnSmart Exercises, an Essay, and a Midterm and Final Exam.

Primary Source Analysis Assignments

Students will be required to complete a Primary Source Analysis activity for each Module. These are comprised of approximately 15 to 25 questions. Students have an unlimited number of attempts to complete the Primary Source Analysis by the deadline to earn the best score possible, which will be 100%. Students may submit the Primary Source Analyses late, but will incur a penalty of 10% per 24 hours after the assignment is due. **Each Module's Primary Source Analysis will be worth 100 points, and comprise 20% of a student's final grade for this course.**

Discussion Boards

Students will be required to participate in a Discussion Board for each Unit of study. Discussion Board Topics will be based on themes of our textbook – traditions and encounters. For each forum, participation will include students responding directly to the posted historical question (initial post) as well as commenting on at least one classmate's post in each forum (response post). Students are required to submit one initial post and one response post for each unit. All posts should be free from grammatical and typical errors. Initial Posts must be at least 100 words in length; each Response Post must be at least 100 words in length. Students must make their own initial post, prior to viewing and responding to the posts of other students. Please note that meeting the minimum requirements in the number of posts and the length of posts will not ensure students full credit. Please see the course website for more specific instructions. **Each Module's postings will be worth 100 points each, and comprise 20% of a student's final grade for this course.**

LearnSmart Exercises

Students will be required to complete the LearnSmart Exercises for each assigned chapter. LearnSmart is a study tool which helps students to review chapter material. Grades are based on completion of the Module, not by correct/incorrect answers (i.e. if a student completes only 70% of the Module by the due date, then the student receives a 70 %; if a student completes 100% of the Module by the due date, then the student receives a 100%). Please see the course website for more specific instructions. LearnSmart Exercises will be worth 100 points each, and comprise 30% of a student's final grade for this course.

Essay

Students will be required to write an essay for HIST 2322. The assignment will be a narrative structure, asking students to write a letter detailing their life in a specific society that we have studied this semester. Students will make specific comparisons to other societies and discuss the economic, political, social, and cultural aspects of their life in the civilization. Further information will be provided on Blackboard. **The Essay Assignment will comprise 10% of a student's final grade for this course.**

Midterm and Final Exams

Students will be required to complete a Chapter Test for each assigned chapter in the textbook. Each test will be comprised of a variety of questions (averaging approximately 20 questions), and students will have TWO attempts to complete the test by the given deadline to earn the best possible score. The Chapter Tests for Chapters 19 through Chapter 26 will comprise the Midterm Exam grade; and Chapters 27 through Chapter 34 will comprise the Final Exam grade. Please see the course website for more specific instructions. Each Exam will comprise 10% of the student's final grade for this course (Midterm 10%; Final 10%)

Communications: Emails will be responded to with 24 hours. If you do not receive a response within 24 hours, then the email was not received. Posts in the Discussion Forum "Questions, Comments, and/or Concerns?" will be monitored by the instructor. Responses by the instructor will be within 72 hours of post. Students are expected to abide by Netiquette rules when communicating online. See this link for details: <u>Netiquette Rules.</u>
