Course Description: 3 credit hours.

Origin and development of the U.S. Constitution, structure and powers of the national government including the legislative, executive, and judicial branches, federalism, political participation, the national election process, public policy, civil liberties and civil rights.

1. Explain the origin and development of constitutional democracy in the United States.
2. Demonstrate knowledge of the federal system.
3. Describe separation of powers and checks and balances in both theory and practice.
4. Demonstrate knowledge of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of the federal government.
5. Evaluate the role of public opinion, interest groups, and political parties in the political system.
6. Analyze the election process.
7. Describe the rights and responsibilities of citizens.
8. Analyze issues and policies in U.S. politics.

Course Structure and Overview:

MidTerm Exam:

MidTerm examination will cover material from the first half of the course, chapter 1 - 8.

Final Exam:

The final exam will focus on material covered in the second half of the course, chapters 9 - 17.

Connect Based Assignments:

Connect based activities include SmartBook chapter readings, concept clips, primary source analyses, podcasts, NewsFlash articles, skill learning activities, and critical thinking activities.

Discussion Based Assignments:

Written assignments that include introductions, self-reflective takeaways, article presentations, and bill proposal.

Government Essay:

An essay on an assigned topic related to current events.

Communications: Emails will be answered within 24 hours. NTCC email is the official form of communication used by the college.

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA):

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is a federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. The law applies to all schools that receive funds under an applicable program of the U.S. Department of Education. FERPA gives parents certain rights with respect to their children's educational records. These rights transfer to the student when he or she attends a school beyond the high school level. Students to whom the rights have transferred are considered "eligible students." In essence, a parent has no legal right to obtain information concerning the child's college records without the written consent of the student. In compliance with FERPA, information classified as "directory information" may be released to the general public without the written consent of the student unless the student makes a request in writing. Directory information is defined as: the student's name, permanent address and/or local address, telephone listing, dates of attendance, most recent previous education institution attended, other information including major, field of study, degrees, awards received, and participation in officially recognized activities/sports.
