Course Description: A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the Civil War/Reconstruction era to the present. United States History II examines industrialization, immigration, world wars, the Great Depression, Cold War and post-Cold War eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History II include: American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, urbanization and suburbanization, the expansion of the federal government, and the study of U.S. foreign policy.

If you do not have access to a computer with the minimum computer requirements, I strongly suggest that you reconsider taking this online course.

Course Structure and Overview:

MidTerm Exam:

MidTerm examination will cover material covered in the first half of the course. (SLO3)

Final Exam:

The final exam will focus on material covered in the second half of the course, but will include some questions that are comprehensive in nature. (SLO3)

History Essay:

Students will write an essay on a topic related to the course. Specific details and requirements can be found in the “History Essay” link in Blackboard. (SLO1)

Participation:

Your participation in this five week online course will include: five weekly Zoom meetings and/or blog posts, five Discussion Board activities, four map activities, and five podcasts, as well as fifteen chapters to read. Students will have the opportunity to share their views and reactions, and ask questions in an online class blog and/or zoom meeting when available. As you read the online textbook, a series of questions will help you understand the material. Your grade will be based on the percentage of questions successfully completed. If you only complete half the questions, your grade will reflect that. If you answer all the questions correctly, you can expect a perfect score. For map and podcast activities, you can complete the activity multiple times and the highest score will count. (SLO2)

Communications: Blackboard messages or direct email serve as the best ways to communicate.

*Reminder: NTCC email is the official form of communication used by the college.
