This syllabus serves as the documentation for all course policies and requirements, assignments, and instructor/student responsibilities.

Course Description: Collection, analysis, presentation and interpretation of data, and probability. Analysis includes descriptive statistics, correlation and regression, confidence intervals and hypothesis testing. Use of appropriate technology is recommended. Three hours credit.

1342.5 Examine, analyze, and compare various sampling distributions for both discrete and continuous random variables.

1342.6 Describe and compute confidence intervals.

1342.7 Solve linear regression and correlation problems.

1342.8 Perform hypothesis testing using statistical methods.

Core Curriculum Purpose and Objectives:

Through the core curriculum, students will gain a foundation of knowledge of human cultures and the physical and natural world; develop principles of personal and social responsibility for living in a diverse world; and advance intellectual and practical skills that are essential for all learning.

Courses in the foundation area of mathematics focus on quantitative literacy in logic, patterns, and relationships. In addition, these courses involve the understanding of key mathematical concepts and the application of appropriate quantitative tools to everyday experience.

Evaluation/Grading Policy:

A series of online Blackboard and classroom engagement opportunities (participation) including in-class/on-line assignments, which are 20% of final grade; and quiz problems (30%) via OHM Lumen in Blackboard (Bb) are 50% of your final grade, and Midterm exam (25%) and Final Exam (25%) will contribute to 50% of the final grade.

Students are required to have access to a computer with high-speed internet, a microphone, a webcam, and appropriate system rights to download and install the necessary software. Please note, the college does not provide this equipment.

Homework via OHM Lumen is graded when submitted. Other assignments including the Midterm and Final Exams are graded within 72 hours **after** the due date.


Any missed work will be made up at the discretion of the instructor. It is the student’s responsibility to contact the instructor.

Blackboard will work on both a Mac and a PC. (Chrome Books are known to have issues with Blackboard.) It is best to access Blackboard through Fire-Fox or Chrome as your web browser. If you have trouble with any of the activities working properly, you might change your web browser as your first solution. The Default Browser in Windows 10 is Edge. This browser does not do well with Blackboard! If you go to Windows Accessories you will find Internet Explorer still on your computer but is not your default browser. If you have any difficulties navigating with Edge, close it and go to Internet Explorer.

To use TEAMS you must have access to a computer with high-speed internet, a microphone, a Webcam, and appropriate systems rights to download any necessary software. Please note, the college does not provide this equipment.

Course Structure and Overview:

This is a sixteen-week hybrid course where students are required to access graded activities on the Blackboard Learning Management System. A typical class involves general participation by all members in discussions regarding mathematical principles and procedures being studied. Students are required to complete online homework, as well as other assignments. It is very important students keep up with course materials and assignments. Students are expected to watch instructional videos, read course textbook, and complete online assignments located in the Learning Management System, Blackboard by due dates.

Video Recording of Course Activities

Certain portions of this course may be recorded via video conferencing software to assist students in course material review or later viewing by a student who was not able to attend the live session. The recordings will be made available only to students within the course and will cease to be available upon completion of the course. Students may not retain, reproduce, or share recordings.

Communications:

Emails, TEAMS, Blackboard and phone messages will be responded to within 24 hours. If you do not receive a response within 24 hours, then the email or phone message was not received. Posts in the Discussion Forum “Questions, Comments, and/or Concerns?” will be monitored by the instructor. Responses by the instructor will be within 72 hours of post. The college’s official means of communication is via your campus email address. I will use your campus email address, TEAMS, and Blackboard messages to communicate with you outside of class. Make sure you keep your campus email cleaned out and below the limit so you can receive important messages.
