Evaluation/Grading Policy: Grading of the Domain Sections

All EMS courses have a cognitive, psychomotor, and affective grading domain. A passing grade must be achieved in all of those domains in order to pass the course. If all three domains are passed, the letter grade will be assigned based on the performance in all 3 domains. Failure of any domain below the "C" range (as determined by the section) will constitute failure of the course regardless of the grades earned in the other 2 domains. Remember, it takes an actual 75 to pass the course in all sections and domains, or you will fail the entire course.
