This syllabus serves as the documentation for all course policies and requirements, assignments, and instructor/student responsibilities.

Course Description: Credit Hours: 1 hour

Transition to professional nursing competencies in the care of patients throughout the lifespan. Validates proficiency in psychomotor skills and clinical reasoning in the performance of nursing procedures related to the concepts of: clinical judgment, comfort, elimination, fluid and electrolytes, nutrition, gas exchange, safety, functional ability, immunity, metabolism, mobility, and tissue integrity. Includes health assessment and medication administration. This course lends itself to a concept-based approach.

Prerequisite(s): Admission to the ADN Program

Corequisite(s): RNSG 1128, RNSG 1162, RNSG1324

Course Learning Outcomes:

1. Apply Concepts and principles necessary for the performance of professional nursing skills across the lifespan (DECs III.A)
2. Demonstrate clinical reasoning and clinical judgment in the performance of professional nursing skills. (DECs II.A, II.E, II.F, III.B)
3. Perform a comprehensive head to toe and a focused health assessment. (DECs II.B, II.C)
4. Demonstrate proficiency in safe medication administration. (DECs I.A, I.B, III.B, III.D)

Evaluation/Grading Policy:

A minimum overall grade of "C" is required in all Academic and Nursing courses before using that course as a prerequisite for the next course in sequence. Academic courses (English, Ethics, etc.) typically work from a grade of 70 or higher for "C". In preparation for the State Board examination, the letter grade assigned to all Nursing courses shall be determined as follows:

Percentage	Letter Grade
90% and above	A
80% -89.99%	B
78%-79.99%	C
77.9% and below	F

You must maintain an exam average of 78% or higher to be eligible to take the final exam. In addition, the overall exam average, including the final exam, must remain at or above 78% before any additional course grades or weighted categories are applied toward the final course grade. Grades will not be rounded when calculating the average (77.5–77.9 is not rounded to 78).

Posting of grades: Exam grades will be posted within 72 hours of the exam, and assignment grades within 7 calendar days of when the student turned in the assignment.

Late work will be graded, then ten points will be deducted each day the assignment is late, up to three days. After the third day, the grade will remain a zero; however, all assignments are required to be completed in order to proceed to the next level of the program.

Course Structure and Overview:

Professional Competencies is a hands-on skills course designed to prepare students for safe and effective clinical practice in the ADN program. This course meets once weekly and focuses on developing, reviewing, and validating essential nursing skills. Skills instruction and competency check-offs are frontloaded at the beginning of the semester prior to the start of clinical rotations.

This course builds upon the knowledge and skills students have previously learned and performed within their current licensure role while introducing additional competencies required for the RN scope of practice. Students will participate in demonstrations, guided practice, simulation activities, and competency evaluations designed to strengthen clinical judgment, technical skills, communication, and patient safety.

Students are expected to come prepared, actively participate in lab activities, practice independently as needed, and successfully demonstrate competency in required skills before entering the clinical setting.

Communications:

The student is expected to communicate with classmates, instructors, various campus and clinical personnel and campus administration in a professional and respectful manner, upholding the highest degree of consideration and ethical practice in an effort to mirror expectations of the profession of nursing.

Email: The student is required to utilize their NTCC-provided student email account for all formal written communication. Please check your NTCC email every day. Email is the official form of communication used at NTCC. All emailed questions to the instructor will be responded to within 24 hours, but usually within a few hours when possible.

Teams messaging notifications: Communication with the instructor through teams messaging is permissible during daytime hours. Instructor will respond no later than 24 hours, but usually within a few hours when possible.
