Course Description: ECON 2302 Microeconomics (three semester hours)

Principles of Microeconomics is a study of the principles underlying the behavior of individual consumers and business firms. Topics include demand and supply, the laws of production and cost, the economics of the firm, international economics, domestic economic problems of business and government, market structures, labor unions, social welfare, and taxes.

Prerequisite(s): None

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of Economics 2302, you should be proficient in the following:

- Forces of demand and supply and how they interact to determine equilibrium price
- How and why equilibrium prices might change and their impact on resource allocation
- The theory of consumer behavior
- The theory of the firm
- Theoretical market structures of perfect competition, monopoly, oligopoly, and monopolistic competition
- Government intervention failures
- Social welfare/taxes

Course Structure and Overview:

Several elements are essential for your success in this course. You will need to understand these fully prior to starting the course:

This is a blended (online & classroom) course and much of the work will be completed in class. <u>If you are not present</u>, you are only eligible for ½ credit on assignments for those days.
- 2. Assignments are due weekly, and sometimes each class day of the week (see course schedule for specific due dates). Thus, keeping up with the schedule is essential to your success. Your personal schedule must allow you to keep up with the due dates for the readings and other assignments. Late work is accepted at the discretion of the instructor and only ½ credit will be given so you must plan your schedule carefully.

You must have continuous access to a working and dependable computer and Internet provider.

The following study sequence will maximize your chances for mastering each lesson in this course:

- 1) Come to class! Chapter assignments and discussions will be completed in class-if you are not there, you are only eligible for ½ credit.
- 2) Read the lesson overview and learning objectives.
- 3) Read assigned material in the textbook.
- 4) Review the learning objectives.
- 5) Review the PowerPoint and take notes as needed (i.e., connected to lesson objectives.)
- 6) Be sure to contact your instructor when you have questions or need help.

Exams:

Exams will include 50 multiple-choice questions and each question is worth 5 points. No exam grades will be dropped. The exams will be timed (1.5 hours). Please see the course schedule attached to this syllabus for dates.

Project:

A 'News / Real world' Micro Economic Project – 200 points

Students will be required to prepare a <u>POWERPOINT OR GOOGLE SLIDES PRESENTATION</u> discussing an important MICRO economic story that has dominated the news over the period of this course. If you are in doubt as to whether what you think is important will also be thought so by me, feel free to clear your topic with me. Your presentation must make clear what the issues are and demonstrate a good use of the tools that you learned in this course to explain, and/or analyze, and/or make recommendations regarding one or more aspects of the story.

Please remember that your textbook is an excellent resource for specific guidance for the topics you should discuss in your presentation. You must use a minimum of 2 sources and those must be included in a works cited page at the end of your presentation (MLA or APA format). You are not required to use in-text citations. Your presentation should be a college level presentation, delivered in a professional manner.

Please remember that this presentation should be <u>your own work</u>—plagiarism (taking someone else's work or ideas and passing them off as one's own) will not be tolerated. Copying from another source and using block quotations from another source is not representative of your own work. <u>Credit will not be given for any work that is plagiarized.</u> Please review the college policy and the course syllabus for details regarding academic honesty.

Please use reputable internet websites; do NOT utilize any Wikipedia or comparable citations. Failure to include citations and references will result in an F. This presentation is due as assigned in BB and is worth 200 points toward your grade. Late presentations will not be accepted.

Discussions for this course will take place in class.

Chapter Assignments:

The exercises and problems will be completed in class.

Late Work Policy:
