# **Evaluation/Grading Policy:**

We will be using the Starry Night curriculum this semester. You will find a link in the class Blackboard that take you to the website where you will complete your assignments. Reading Quizzes are expected to be completed the week before stated on the schedule posted at the end of this syllabus. Reading Quizzes in Starry Night will represent 20% of your grade and Exercises in Starry Night will count 30%. Participation in class discussions counts a total of 20% (absences or refusal to participate will result in losing points). There will be four tests: Chapter Test 1, Midterm (Chapters 1-7), Chapter Test 2, and a Final Exam (Chapters 8-14). Each test is worth 10% of your final grade. The letter grading system is:
