Course Description: Principles of Accounting I is a study of accounting concepts and their applications in transaction analysis and financial statement preparation, and asset and equity accounting in corporations. Emphasis is on the accounting cycle for services and merchandising enterprises.

Prerequisite(s): None

- 1. Students will demonstrate the differences in various legal forms of organization and ownership.
- 2. Students will demonstrate the use of accounting language and the basic accounting equation.
- 3. Students will demonstrate an understanding of basic business transactions, adjusting entries, and closing entries.
- 4. Students will demonstrate an understanding of the accounting cycle and accounting methods.
- 5. Students will demonstrate the ability to prepare financial statements.
