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This syllabus serves as the documentation for all course policies and requirements, assignments, and instructor/student responsibilities.

Course Description: 3 credit hours

Exploration and further training within the basic principles and tools of acting, including an emphasis on critical analysis of oneself and others. The tools include ensemble performing, character and script analysis, and basic theatre terminology. This will continue the exploration of the development of the actor's instrument: voice, body, and imagination.

Prerequisite(s): Acting I

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Analyze scripts more in depth from the viewpoint of the actor.
- 2. Analyze, develop, and perform more complex characters.
- 3. Demonstrate effective and safe use of the voice and body.
- 4. Define and discuss terms and concepts using an expanded vocabulary of theatre.
- 5. Perform at an increasingly skilled level in ensemble building exercises, scenes, and final projects, which may include participation in plays.
- 6. Analyze and critique personal and peer performances.

Evaluation/Grading Policy: The method of assessment will be as follows:

1) Reflection Papers: There will be three (3) Reflection Papers due after each small group scene performance. These should be submitted on Blackboard. Please spell check, use correct punctuation, and develop your own ideas and thoughts. These papers are one page in length and are similar to journal entries you may have been required to keep in other acting classes. The

most important thing to include in these papers is what you have learned from the assignment.

- 3 Reflection papers @ 100 points each -300 possible points (Beckett, Albee, and Durang)
- 2) MOOD Papers: Students will submit their MOOD evaluations for each of the three scenes on Blackboard by the assigned due date. These should be legible and detailed.

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3 MOOD Papers @ 100 points each -300 possible points (Beckett, Albee, and Durang)
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- 3) Rehearsals in Class: Students will rehearse their scenes in front of the instructor and class, as guided practice. These rehearsals are to be memorized with blocking.
 - 3 Graded In-Class Rehearsals @ 100 points each 300 possible points
- 4) Performance of Scenes: Students will perform three (3) scenes with different partners. Grades will be determined by how much growth has occurred between the graded rehearsal and graded performance.
 - 3 Scenes with Partners @ 100 points each = 300 possible points
- 5) Participation: Students will be required to complete each of the assigned readings so that they are able to contribute to and participate in class discussions. Failure to complete the readings will result in a deduction of participation points.

Participation – 500 possible points

5) Final Performance of Scenes: Students will perform all three scenes PLUS an added large group scene for their final exam. There will be an invited audience to attend the Final Performance.
