**Course Description:** 3 credit hours

Study of the history of the theatre from primitive times through the renaissance.

Prerequisite(s): DRAM 1310 Theatre Appreciation

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Analyze the history of theatre through written responses of historical texts, artifacts, and performance practices.
- 2. Identify essential terminology related to the history of theatre.
- 3. Evaluate current productions of historical plays through an understanding of their original production conditions.
- 4. Evaluate the interaction between theatre and society.

### **Evaluation/Grading Policy:** The method of assessment will be as follows:

1. Reading responses – there will be five thoughtful reading responses throughout the semester, which includes the Midterm exam. Four will be worth up to 100 points, and the Midterm is worth 200 points.

Four responses @ 100 points each -400 possible points Midterm Essay -200 possible points

2. Final Exam Essay – the final exam will be due on Blackboard at the end of the semester. It will be comprehensive and cover material throughout the semester. It is worth up to 200 points.

Final Essay – 200 possible points

3. Power Point Presentations – students will be presenting 5 different power point presentations to the class over various topics, all related to specific periods in theatre history.

Five presentations @ 100 points each – 500 possible points

4. Quizzes – There will be 6 quizzes given throughout the semester on the readings. 6 Quizzes at 50 points each – 300 possible points

5. Participation – participation is worth 400 points and will be calculated at the end of the semester
