This syllabus serves as the documentation for all course policies and requirements, assignments, and instructor/student responsibilities.

Course Description: ECON 2302 Microeconomics (three semester hours)

Analysis of the behavior of individual economic agents, including consumer behavior and demand, producer behavior and supply, price and output decisions by firms under various market structures, factor markets, market failures, and international trade. **Prerequisite(s):** None

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of Economics 2302, students will:

- 1. Explain the role of scarcity, specialization, opportunity cost and cost/benefit analysis in economic decision-making.
- 2. Identify the determinants of supply and demand; demonstrate the impact of shifts in both market supply and demand curves on equilibrium price and output.
- 3. Summarize the law of diminishing marginal utility; describe the process of utility maximization.
- 4. Calculate supply and demand elasticities, identify the determinants of price elasticity of demand and supply, and demonstrate the relationship between elasticity and total revenue.
- 5. Describe the production function and the Law of Diminishing Marginal Productivity; calculate and graph short-run and long-run costs of production.
- 6. Identify the four market structures by characteristics; calculate and graph the profit maximizing price and quantity in the output markets by use of marginal analysis.
- 7. Determine the profit maximizing price and quantity of resources in factor markets under perfect and imperfect competition by use of marginal analysis.
- 8. Describe governmental efforts to address market failure such as monopoly power, externalities, and public goods.
- 9. Identify the benefits of free trade using the concept of comparative advantage.

Course Structure and Overview:

This is an online course and will require extensive engagement (with other students, the instructor, and the course materials), as well as timely completion of assignments. <u>Assignments are often due **multiple times**</u> <u>a week as this is a short course</u>. Exams:

Project:

A 'News / Real world' Micro Economic Project – 200 points

Students will be required to prepare a <u>POWERPOINT OR GOOGLE SLIDES PRESENTATION</u> discussing an important MICRO economic story that has dominated the news over the period of this course. If you are in doubt as to whether what you think is important will also be thought so by me, feel free to clear your topic with me. Your presentation must make clear what the issues are, and demonstrate a good use of the tools that you learned in this course to explain, and/or analyze, and/or make recommendations regarding one or more aspects of the story.

Please remember that your textbook is an excellent resource for specific guidance for the topics you should discuss in your presentation. You must use a minimum of 2 sources and those must be included in a works cited page at the end of your presentation (MLA or APA format). You are not required to use in-text citations. Your presentation should be a college level presentation, delivered in a professional manner.

Please remember that this presentation should be <u>your own work</u>—plagiarism (taking someone else's work or ideas and passing them off as one's own) will not be tolerated. Copying from another source and using block quotations from another source is not representative of your own work. <u>Credit will not be given for for any work that is plagiarized.</u>

Please review the college policy and the course syllabus for details regarding academic honesty.

Please use reputable internet websites; do NOT utilize any Wikipedia or comparable citations. Failure to include citations and references will result in an F. This presentation is due as assigned in BB and is worth 200 points toward your grade. Late presentations will not be accepted.

Online Discussion:

You have 1 online discussion board and it should be completed during week 1 as this relates directly to this course syllabus. No peer replies are required.

Exercises and Problems:

The exercises and problems are to be completed in Blackboard. Please see each chapter's material in BB for the specific exercises and problems assigned. The assignments can be submitted for credit no later than the assigned due date at midnight. **No late work will be accepted.** See course schedule below for specifics.

<u>Quizzes:</u>

There are 2 multiple choice quizzes that are to be completed in Blackboard. These are related to your chapter material and each quiz has 30 questions and is worth 45 points. You have 2 attempts on each quiz and the highest grade will be counted. There is a 45-minute time-limit for each quiz. All quizzes must be taken within the assigned time-frame and no late quizzes will be accepted. <u>There is no</u> <u>proctoring requirement for the quizzes</u>.

In addition to adding points to your course grade, these quizzes are great practice for the exams but <u>please do not use them as your only study tool.</u> The homework questions and problems will also be represented on your exams and these short quizzes cannot possibly cover all of that material. So, these quizzes are merely a "sample" of what the test questions might look like and not reflective of everything that you will be tested on. All quiz answers will be released to you after the due date passes. See course schedule below for specific due dates.

Late Work Policy:

The chapter based graded assignments will be graded on a completion/effort only basis. This means that if you complete them and you have a reasonable answer you will receive full credit. Immediately following the due date, I will post the answers to all chapter assignments within Blackboard in the "Homework Answers" link. You may then review the answers and let me know if you have questions. **Because I post the answers, late work will NOT be accepted and you will not receive credit for late work under any circumstances.** Please allow yourself an appropriate amount of time to complete the coursework. Students who wait until the last minute often miss the deadline and then cannot receive credit for their work. All due dates for the entire course are included with this syllabus so you can work as far ahead as you would like. Please understand that I must adhere to this policy for all students so exceptions will not be made.
